## Dear Members and Friends of St. Mary's, St. Patrick's and St. Peter's Cathedral:

This is year B in the lectionary—the cycle of readings for Sunday Mass. Our Gospels in Ordinary Time are a more or less continuous reading of the Gospel according to St. Mark. Mark's is the shortest Gospel and in the opinion of most scholars the earliest one. Because of its brevity there is an interruption when we get to the story of the miraculous feeding of the crowd in the wilderness. We switch from Mark to John 6, the "Bread of Life" chapter, and today we hear John's account of the feeding of the 5000. In the coming weeks Jesus will teach the Eucharistic meaning of the miracle.

But for today it is the miracle itself on which we focus. It is important that we do so, for we live in a world that often denies the very possibility of miracles and along the way obscures even the wonder of the predictable and ordinary. A narrow "scientism" pretends that there is nothing and can be nothing that is not observable, measurable and predictable. That leaves out a lot—love, mystery, creativity, and beauty for starters. The same attitude finds itself incapable of identifying moral truths because it sees no ultimate purpose or meaning in the universe.

The biblical assumption that miracles can and do happen opens us to a deeper reality, one that understands that existence itself is a miracle of God's love and mercy.

God has indeed created a world that seems to run on its own—if your point of view is narrow enough. But miracles remind us of a greater truth. The 'laws of nature,' which miracles seem to break, are not the only thing that is real. What is most real and ultimately real is the God behind what we call the laws of nature. And miracles do not break the laws of nature so much as they introduce into the world signs of the God who calls all things into being and sustains them. Miracles reveal the deeper truth of the matter.

Some years ago a Notre Dame professor lectured in Wilmington about her research on the work of the Congregation for the Causes of Saints, the Vatican dicastery that elevates causes for canonization. Having read much of the documentation, she said that she could not imagine how anyone who read the same material could be an atheist.

If the miracles attributed to the intercession of the saints are that moving, how much more so should the miracles of Christ buttress our faith!
