Dear Members and Friends of St. Mary's, St. Patrick's and St. Peter's Cathedral:

The Church has entered again the crisis of sexual abuse and leadership failures that exploded in our country in 2002. We need to remember how that earlier crisis led to major reforms in the protection of minors, and the Catholic Church in America is arguably one of the safest places for young people.

What we are learning of now is major failures in morality and in Episcopal leadership throughout the world and in Rome, to say nothing of continuing issues in the United States. I should add that our Diocese remains responsible both to its own people and to the civil authorities and is cooperating with the attorney general as it has done in the past. It has also been over 25 years since a credible charge of sexual abuse of a minor has been leveled against any priest, deacon or lay employee of our Diocese.

But the bad news is still real and discouraging, and I want to share with you some reasons for my own hope. First, it is Jesus Christ himself. The failure of his followers, high and low, reminds us of why we needed a Savior in the first place.

For me there is also the exposure to the faith of the people of God, which is among most so remarkably unshaken through all of this. You know in whom you have believed and the clergy are not where we put our faith, although you have the right to expect much better.

As I write, I recall the procession out of the Cathedral following the funeral of Sr. Mary George Barlow, a member of the community of the Daughters of Charity who have ministered there so long. In the procession was just a portion of her large Catholic family, several of whom I had encountered in the past. I heard from some of them their deep faith and gratitude for the Church's ministry.

I recall also a wedding I celebrated a few months ago in a Catholic university chapel which for reasons best left unexplored had no kneelers for the bride and groom. But when I looked up from the missal briefly during the Eucharistic prayer, there was the whole wedding party including the bride in her long white dress kneeling on the stone floor. And I get to sit in the confessional and work with you toward deeper holiness. I am moved by the devotion I see.

Like many of you, I am annoyed, wounded and disappointed by much that is happening in the Church, but Jesus is still present and the Holy Spirit is at work. Take heart.

Again this week there is not much new to report on the health situation. The slow recovery from the injury continues. Stamina is recovering slowly, and I am between chemo treatments. Later in the month I will have a bone marrow biopsy (this time CT guided to avoid another disastrous accident) to see how the chemo is working.
